Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

7. Description

The Argonne apartment house is a six story building on Cleveland's near west side which is representative of the early commercial style in architecture. The building is constructed of yellow brick with wood framed windows and main entranceway. Timber serves as the supporting structure of the floors and roof. At the front of the building the entrance is an arch surmounted by an architrave with two windows of identical size on either side. Five windows span each of the next four stories, with the center window on the second story surmounted by a triangular pediment. The windows on the top story are smaller than the others and eight in number.

The south side of the building is distinguished by a vertical rank of bay windows at both the front and rear of the structure. On this same side each of the second through fifth stories has twelve windows across with a smaller window being the third and the tenth. A fire escape runs the full height of the building on the south side, in effect, dividing the building in half. On the first story the windows in the front half match those on the stories above. The rear half has the windows interrupted by rounded arched brick entryways. Also, on the south side the windows across the sixth story are of equal size. Around the entire building above the sixth story is a corbelled parapet.

The north side is divided into four bays defined by recessed light wells.

The building is in a general state of disrepair with roof damage, peeling paint, broken glass and plaster damage. Although the building is suffering from deterioration none of its significant architectural details, overall massing or plan have been compromised.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Jennings apartment building significantly illustrates the commercial style of architecture which evolved in the last half of the 19th and early part of the 20th century. The Jennings' architect, John N. Richardson, was one of the prominent professionals in this field in Cleveland. Furthermore, the building carries a social as well as an architectural significance. The Jennings, in fact, was one of the first "high rise" apartment houses to appear on the Cleveland scene, opening the way to a new style of living for Cleveland residents.


The commercial style in architecture flourished in the late 1800s. It is characterized by a functional simplicity in design which formerly appeared more often in warehouse and factory design. The Jennings demonstrates this characteristic with its simple yellow brick walls and bay windows.

John N. Richardson represented a new trend of architect for his period, the trained professional more frequently being employed to design larger buildings. Although he was born and educated in Scotland, Richardson emigrated to Cleveland in the 1860s. Richardson's association with architect Frank Edward Cudell in 1871 began what became the most prominent architectural firm in the city of Cleveland in the 1880s.

Cudell and Richardson designed some of the most significant buildings in Cleveland including the Root McBride Building on Lake Avenue and 6th Street now known as the Bradley Building and the Perry-Payne Building at 740 Superior Avenue N.W. The partnership was also responsible for the design of St. Joseph's Roman Catholic Church at Woodland Avenue and East 23rd Street, St. Stephen's Roman Catholic Church on West 54th Street, and the Franklin Circle Christian Church. All of these buildings are listed in the National Register. Following the dissolution of the partnership, Richardson himself designed the Jennings and the Woodland Avenue and West Side Street Railway Powerhouse at Elm and Riverbed Streets. Clearly, John Richardson stands as a significant architect of commercial structures in the city of Cleveland in the late 19th century.

The Jennings stands at the forefront of a change in living style for Clevelanders. Prior to 1900 private homes afforded the major type of residential housing. Very few apartment houses were listed in the city business directory. By 1910 the listing contained 750 apartment buildings. The Jennings was clearly one of the first, with the date 1898 carved into the masonry. The building has served as an apartment house since its construction, continuing to be representative of the new form of residential living in the early 20th century.
